SUBJECT: REQUEST AUTHORIZATION FOR THE SUPERINTENDENT TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT WITH THE SMITHSONIAN EARLY ENRICHMENT CENTER (SEEC), IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$97,000, TO PROVIDE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SERVICES THAT SUPPORT MUSEUM-BASED LEARNING, EFFECTIVE APRIL 19, 2006, THROUGH JUNE 9, 2006

COMMITTEE: INSTRUCTIONAL EXCELLENCE AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Authorization is requested for the Superintendent to enter into a contractual agreement with the Smithsonian Early Enrichment Center (SEEC), in an amount not to exceed \$97,000, effective April 19, 2006, through June 9, 2006, to provide rigorous professional development grounded in the fundamentals of museum studies and museum-based learning. The contractual agreement is for a seven-week term with an additional term renewal option for the 2006-2007 school year at a cost not to exceed \$97,000, consistent with the terms of the contract and the requirements of the United States Department of Education (USDOE), Magnet Schools Assistance Program (MSAP) grant.

The SEEC is an educational program with multiple sites, located directly within the Smithsonian museum complex. The mission of the SEEC is two-fold: to provide a model, high-quality educational program for young children, and to advance educational opportunities for all children by sharing the SEEC's expertise on a national level, thereby furthering the educational mandate of the Smithsonian Institution. As a model program with specific expertise in museum-based education for young children, the SEEC provides leadership within the educational community and extends its expertise through national seminars, conferences, curriculum licensing, and consulting.

The program will focus on museum-based learning as a strategy that extends student learning beyond the textbook by studying objects in museums and in the classroom. Objects offer real-world, concrete, sensory-based opportunities for exploring ideas and concepts that heighten awareness and stimulate interest in learning thereby creating and sustaining an effective learning environment.

On October 26, 2004, The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, authorized the Superintendent to accept a grant award, entitled "Expanding Choice Options for Every Student" (ECHOES), from the USDOE for funding under the MSAP. The purpose of ECHOES is to develop and implement high quality public school magnet programs that

promote practices that result in improved student academic performance while reducing minority group isolation.

The SEEC will provide professional development services over 11 days for approximately 250 teachers from three of the ECHOES schoolwide programs; Southside Elementary, Shenandoah Middle, and Miami Springs Middle schools. The training, which will be part of Summer Heat, is designed to provide participants with the ability to incorporate museum-based learning strategies into their curriculum, thereby enabling teachers to make a paradigm shift in instructional methodology. Also, included in the contract are two planning sessions that focus on curriculum writing, determining the immediate training and resource needs, and developing a course of action to address the identified needs.

The Professional Services Contract Committee established by School Board Rule 6Gx13- 3F-1.021, reviewed this Board item on March 30, 2006, and recommended that an exception to the rule regarding bids or Request for Proposals be granted for the SEEC as specific expertise. Specific expertise is based on the Smithsonian Institution's history in successfully implementing educational programs that are geared toward infusing literacy with intensive museum-based instruction. Specialized Programs – Schools of Choice seeks to replicate the SEEC's program at several Miami-Dade County Public Schools which have museum themes. As the Smithsonian Early Enrichment Center is the only program in the nation concurrently implementing and providing comprehensive training in museum-based education, a Request for Proposal (RFP) was not initiated.

The Executive Director of the Smithsonian Early Enrichment Center (SEEC) is Dr. Sharon Shaffer.

The appropriation for this item is included in the Other Federal Programs Fund of the 2005-2006 Adopted Budget under Fund 0420, Function 6300, Program 3892, Object 5310, Location 9610.

RECOMMENDED: That The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, authorize the Superintendent to:

1. enter into a contractual agreement with the Smithsonian Early Enrichment Center (SEEC) to provide professional development services that support museum-based learning, in an amount not to exceed \$97,000, effective April 19, 2006, through June 9, 2006;
2. grant an exception to Board Rule 6Gx13- 3F-1.021, for SEEC based on specific expertise; and
3. renew the contractual agreement for an additional term for the 2006-2007 school-year at a cost not to exceed \$97,000, consistent with the terms of the contract and the requirements of the United States Department of Education (USDOE).

The appropriation for this item is included in the Magnet Schools Assistance Program (MSAP) grant for Specialized Programs – Schools of Choice.
