SUBJECT:

REQUEST THAT THE SCHOOL BOARD OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY DIRECT THE SUPERINTENDENT TO DIRECT STAFF TO DESIGNATE AN ARCHITECT TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ALL ASPECTS OF COMPILING AND COMPLETING THE APPLICATIONS FOR THE SIT AWARDS AVAILABLE FROM THE STATE OF FLORIDA SMART SCHOOLS CLEARINGHOUSE. THIS TEMPORARY ASSIGNMENT REQUIRES THE REASSIGNMENT OF ONE FULL TIME EXISTING EMPLOYEE FOR APPROXIMATELY THREE MONTHS

In 1997, the State of Florida established the Smart Schools Clearinghouse to assist school districts in building SMART schools utilizing functional and frugal practices. Smart Schools are schools that are soundly made, accountable, reasonable, and thrifty. The Smart Schools Clearinghouse was funded and authorized to give grants to school districts which constructed schools meeting the program's guidelines. The program established cost targets for construction of permanent student stations and calculates the amount of the award for a specific school as half of the money the school district saved by building the school below the cost target.

Miami-Dade County Public Schools has built and is continuing to build schools which could qualify Revised for major awards if the applications are properly submitted before the award funds are exhausted. Time is of the essence because awards are on a first come, first served basis. As of this date, these grants, called SIT Awards, have been given to many school districts throughout Florida. For example, Broward County Schools received a SIT award of \$13,000,000 at their February Board meeting. (See attached Exhibit A for awards made to date.) The program was initially funded with \$350,000,000 and only about \$160,000,000 is still available. There is no assurance by the legislature that this program will continue after the present funds are exhausted.

While numerous awards have been made for Charter Schools in Miami-Dade County, we have not yet submitted complete and correct applications to the Clearinghouse for review and award for our recently completed schools. In several meetings with staff, the only reason advanced for not having already applied for the awards was lack of resources. When everyone is responsible no one is responsible. Someone must be assigned to have as his or her primary responsibility the completion of the SIT award application for each eligible school. Because of the complexity of the application process, and the need for a thorough understanding of the rules in order to maximize potential awards, the most efficient way to ensure that the applications are completed quickly and correctly is to temporarily reassign an architect, currently employed by the school system, to be responsible for the application process under the supervision of the Chief of Facilities. If not done quickly Miami-Dade County Public Schools may lose millions of dollars of construction money from this source.

ACTION PROPOSED BY

JACQUELINE V. PEPPER: That The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, direct the Superintendent to direct staff to designate an architect to be responsible for all aspects of compiling and completing the applications for the SIT awards available from the State of Florida SMART Schools Clearinghouse. This temporary assignment requires the reassignment of one full time existing employee for approximately three months.
