The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has reported that in 2009, 11 percent of all drivers involved in fatal car crashes in the United States were between the ages of 15 to 20. Authorities cited common risk factors such as nighttime driving, text messaging, alcohol-impaired driving, and driving with multiple passengers in the vehicle. As a way of promoting safe teen driver skills and to help reduce crashes involving teen drivers in communities throughout the nation, the United States Congress designated the third week of each October as National Teen Driver Safety Week. This national awareness campaign is making great strides, as statistics show teenage driver fatalities have declined by 35 percent from 2000 to 2009. This year, the national event will run from October 14 - 20, 2012. This safety initiative encourages parents, young drivers, lawmakers and educators to work together to change risky driving behaviors at the high school age level and help save lives across the country.

To advance this important teen driver safety initiative at Miami-Dade County Public Schools, it is recommended that the School Board endorse the week of October 14- 20. 2012, as National Teen Driver Safety Week. During this week, the winning Public Service Announcements and Posters developed by senior high school students for the 2012 Senior High School Student Safety Campaign contest will be reproduced and distributed to all District senior high school campuses, along with promotional safety material.

ACTION PROPOSED BY CHAIR MS. PERLA TABARES HANTMAN:

That The School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, endorse National Teen Driver Safety Week, October 14-20, 2012, and encourage year-round teen driver safety skills at all District senior high schools.
