SUBJECT: SCHOOL BOARD ENDORSEMENT OF THE 2016 INTERNATIONAL “WALK TO SCHOOL DAY”, AND IMPLEMENTATION OF THE “WALKSAFE” PEDESTRIAN SAFETY PROGRAM CURRICULUM, DURING THE WEEK OF THE EVENT

International “Walk to School Day,” planned for October 4, 2016, is designed to promote awareness about pedestrian safety among students, parents, and schools. The program reinforces safe routes to schools and safe walking skills, as well as walking as exercise to combat childhood obesity. The program is environmentally friendly because it reduces pollution generated by school-related traffic, and reinforces the importance of obeying school zone speed limits.

In 2015, the Miami-Dade Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee endorsed the “Walk to School Day” event. This safety awareness campaign is crucial in our communities, as alarming data provided by Ryder Trauma Center and Nicklaus Children’s Hospital reveals 38 children under the age of 15 were injured and three (3) killed in traffic crashes in Miami-Dade County during 2015. Between January and March of 2016, there were five (5) injuries and one (1) fatality reported for children under the age of 15 related to traffic crashes.

In October 2015, 213 schools implemented the “WalkSafe” pedestrian safety program curriculum to coincide with the “Walk to School Day” event. The Office of Physical Education and Health Literacy will continue to spearhead its implementation at all District elementary schools. “WalkSafe” was created by the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine to reduce pediatric pedestrian injuries and fatalities.

Both programs are operated at no cost to the District.
