Sudden Cardiac Arrest Awareness Month provides an opportunity to inform the public about the dangers and risk factors associated with cardiac emergencies and what to do when these emergencies arise. Sudden cardiac death is the leading cause of death among student athletes. In recognition of this month, we want to recognize some of the organizations that are dedicated to promoting awareness of cardiac health for all.

HeartCharged’s founders, Bethany and Hannah Keime, were high-school students when they learned the heartbreaking news that they had been diagnosed with hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM). While this detrimental diagnosis cut their athletic pursuits short, they were grateful for the screening that identified this asymptomatic “silent killer.” The two sisters searched for a support network of other students with HCM only to learn that most student athletes had died from HCM because their condition went undiagnosed.

The Keime sisters recognized that a simple heart screening had not only saved their lives but could save others. Their story is what they define as “survivor’s gratitude,” as they are fortunate to be survivors of a disease that is often undiagnosed. Their advocacy journey began ten years ago when they hosted their first public assembly for their classmates at Cutler Bay Senior High School. Today, they host informative assemblies at local schools, work tirelessly alongside local and state legislators to propose and pass policies, and host free informative training sessions on CPR and AED usage.

Like the Keime sisters, Maria “Maruchi” Menendez, is a strong supporter of cardiac health. After the unfortunate loss of her son, Ramiro “Toti” Mendez, she began her advocacy by handing out flyers to parents of student-athletes. Maruchi went on to found the JunTos Foundation, in honor of her son, which works to prevent the unnecessary loss of young people to heart disease and cancer.
